Collaborating and combining land management practices

Join Oli Moraes from DJAARA, who will discuss and showcase partnerships and projects on Country featuring collaboration with private landholders. The session will highlight what principles would apply to landcare and different forms of engagement with First Nations groups. An overview of case studies and a snapshot of cultural competence training will be followed by a discussion, providing time to talk about what works well and the importance of relationship building as first steps to engagement with Traditional Owners.

Aggregating action for landscape scale impacts

Landcare Networks have been driving a number of Landscape Restoration Projects across Victoria with support from philanthropy, government and their local communities. The wide-ranging requirements and support needed to get large scale projects off the ground means landcare has had various degrees of success in implementing such projects in the past. Be it financial, policy settings, coordination of resources or landholder uptake, there are various lessons to be learnt from such projects. This session will explore how landcare can make an impact at scale.

Panel Session - Water in the Landscape

The panel will discuss what the contribution of landcare to the field of rehydrating the landscape might look like in the future, and how it may reshape our work, skills, policy and financing.

Geoff's presentation will focus on the Moolort Plains wetlands and the history, values and conservation efforts that have been led by the Moolort Landcare Group. It will feature a fantastic video showing drone footage of the wetlands taken in January 2023. 2022 was the wettest year on record for the Moolort Plains, and the filling of the wetlands led to an influx of significant bird species, many of which bred successfully during this time.

Panel Session - Water in the Landscape

Sophie Bickford - Biolinks Alliance



Sophie is a Conservation Ecologist deeply motivated to apply her expertise to real world ecological-social problems. After completing her PhD at The University of Adelaide, Sophie spent 7 years researching distribution patterns of biodiversity at the CSIRO Centre for Plant Biodiversity Research. She was appointed a Lecturer in Biogeography at Monash University in 2007. Sophie worked for Carbon Planet as their Chief Scientist, developing methodologies for conserving ecological-services using climate (carbon) and biodiversity markets. As Executive Director of Biolinks Alliance since 2010, she relishes the challenge of growing an emerging organisation to implement large-scale and tenure blind conservation in Victoria.

Ross Colliver - Riddells Creek Landcare



Ross is prototyping ways for landcare groups in the Jacksons Creek and Deep Creek catchment of the upper Maribyrnong to appreciate waterways and understand how water is managed in the landscape. *Creek Stories* tells the stories of creeks and the people looking after them. The idea here is that to do more, first appreciate what's being done already. The Water Think Tank brings together environmentalists across the two catchments to understand how water is managed in all of its manifestations - as creeks, water supply, waste water, stormwater and groundwater. The guiding idea is to improve management of water, understand how it works.





David Hardwick - Soil Land Food



David is a professional agroecologist and Director at Soil Land Food, a small agroecology consultancy. For over 20 years he has worked on rural landscape, farming and food systems projects. He develops and delivers many of the extension projects for Soil Land Food across Australia. He worked in community development and then horticulture before completing a dairy traineeship on an organic dairy in NSW. Since then, he has had a wide-ranging career working in both extension, management and technical roles. These include Landcare extension, agronomy, soils, agribusiness, biofertiliser R&D and manufacturing, organics, training, and consulting positions. For many years he also helped run a regional farmers market business with his wife. Recent projects he has worked on include the Mulloon Institute's capacity building projects, the HASH Soils project and developing the Rural Landscape Logic approach to rural planning. David's passion is agroecology and empowering farmers with knowledge and skills so they can make decisions that make a difference!


